Auxiliary and Foundation Annual Reports

Associate Vice Chancellor for Advancement and Communications John Valencia highlighted the activities of the Foundation for Grossmont & Cuyamaca College over the past year, beginning with an overview of the new



organizational structure focused on the goal of building relationships.

Foundation accomplishments include the launch of the "Give A Dream" music video, which received over 40,000 views and raised \$59,634; \$15,500 in mini-grants for various college programs; \$9,000 for major

GCCCD Auxiliary Executive Director Sally Cox, who joined the Auxiliary in April 2014, presented her first annual report on the Auxiliary's activities. The Auxiliary has 150 employees, including about 100 part-time employees. It processed \$6.7 million in funds. Cox described ways the Auxiliary supports students with grants and other assistance, such as the recent AARP grant for the Grossmont College Office Professional Training program that was secured through the Foundation and Auxiliary.

Trustees expressed their appreciation for the well-organized tour of the Cuyamaca One-Stop Center prior to the Governing Board meeting.

Board member Debbie Justeson commended Miles on leading the effort to create the new East County Education Alliance, a partnership between the District and the Grossmont Union High School District. She said the

alliance will help strengthen education and the workforce in East County.

Rosinski congratulated the District for receiving the 2014 Higher Education Excellence in Diversity Award, a national award received by colleges and universities for outstanding commitment to diversity and inclusion. The District was the only community college in the region to be recognized.

Cuyamaca College Student Trustee Jocelyn Estrada reported on numerous student events, including recent Diversity Dialogues and a student safety awareness workshop led by San Diego Sheriff's deputies. On Nov. 25, Cuyamaca hosts its annual Native American College Hour and Pow-Wow.

Grossmont College Student Trustee Zack Gianino said ASGC's \$1,500 donation to the Child Development Center has encouraged other student governments to support their own Child Development Centers. Gianino attended a Student Empowerment Club workshop on Race and Injustice in America.

President Bill Garrett added his praise for the new East County Education Alliance, recalling that the need for this was recognized

more than 14 years with the introduction of Cal-PASS. Garrett attended the Grossmont College speech tournament and noted more information needs to get out about various campus activities. He said the Grossmont College Theater Arts Department and Music Department Facebook pages are excellent.
