# **EOPS Summer Institute Program**

The Extended Opportunity Programs and Services (EOPS) Summer Institute Program kicked off earlier this summer with three cohorts of students, an expansion from years' past. The 75 total students are enrolled in either Math 90 (elementary algebra) with Counseling 130 (study skills and time management), Math 88 (pre-algebra) with Counseling 120 (college and career success),

or English 105 (college reading) with Counseling 120. Funding for this year's Summer Institute Program came from a variety of sources, allowing the program to expand and enroll any incoming freshmen who needed a foundation in English and/or Math in order to be successful this fall. Other activities include a field day and barbecue, leadership training and weekly community events, such as Skype conversations with a Rwandan refugee and a visit to the Museum of Tolerance in Los Angeles. Coordinated by **EOPS Counselor Michael Perez**, the Summer Institute Program



receives support from Admissions and Records, Financial Aid and Counseling, Math and English faculty, among others. The Summer Institute Program will host its closing ceremony featuring student work and a video summary from 2 - 3:30 p.m., Thursday, July 30, in Griffin Gate.

# <u>CVT program students volunteered at the Eric Parades</u> Save a Life Event





In June, Cardiovascular Technology (CVT) program students volunteered at the Eric Parades Save a Life event in Rancho Bernardo. The event, sponsored by the El Cajon-based Eric Parades Save a Life Foundation, offered free heart screenings to teenagers courtesy of the CVT program student volunteers, and CPR and automated external defibrillator (AED) training. Students helped screen 1,167 teenagers, the organization's largest group to date, and found six with high risk and 18 with heart abnormalities. Eric Parades was a 15-year-old East County resident who died of Sudden Cardiac Arrest/Death in 2009.

### <u>Theatre Arts Department hosted 45 middle school</u> <u>students</u>

The Theatre Arts Department hosted 45 middle school students from Lakeside, providing a preview of "Cinderella," and a tour of the Stagehouse Theatre, and costume and scene workshops. After the Theatre Arts tour, students took a tour of the Grossmont College campus, visiting the Learning Technologies and Resource Center, Griffin Center and other campus buildings.
