<p>1. Research and Volunteer Request</p>	<p>Sahar explained that research is taking longer than expected due to a lack of volunteers. She asked for more participation to speed up the process and guarantee transparency of the report. Julio and Daryl both volunteered to assist. Nicole will follow up with them via email to discuss.</p>
<p>2. Review of Sheriff Contract Cost</p>	<p>Sahar reviewed the past 6 years of costs with the taskforce. In addition she discussed the number of deputies employed, coverage and the intricacies of the contract. Overhead costs are a large portion of the contract and this was discussed for quite some time. Particularly it was mentioned by a counselor that a PERT</p>

	<p>team is called often 1-2 times per month minimum for assistance. The question was raised if the PERT team would be free without a contract. Nicole explained that yes, they can send someone however, the average wait time may more than double without a proper MOU in place with law enforcement. There is a priority listing of calls for the surrounding city and the calls from campus would be placed in line with all the others. There were concerns from health services folks that waiting several hours for a PERT team member would inadvertently affect students in the surrounding areas. Sahar also reviewed the 2020/2021 budget which has been reduced to two deputies during our COVID closure.</p>
<p>3. Research Updates and Policing Models</p>	<p>That taskforce was again reminded of the goals and outcomes of these meetings by Sahar. She stated that we need to make a recommendation of a policing model for the 2021/2022 year.</p> <p>Nicole Conklin and Anne Krueger reviewed findings and the difficulty of obtaining information. Nicole explained her conversations with two Chiefs of Police from local community colleges. One of the main themes which kept popping up during conversation was getting a proper read from your student population. We are here to serve students and ensure their safety and hearing directly from them would be impactful to our decision. Many agreed with the sentiment but worried about getting a proper snapshot in time due to the campus being closed for the pandemic. After debate it was decided a survey for both students and staff would be beneficial but should probably be separated. Nicole is going to reach out to Joan and Brianna to ask for assistance putting together the survey for a maximum outcome.</p>

	<p>Frank and Elaine discussed liability concerns of an in house police department and some of the other costs which are often missed. Nicole shared a small list of costs which were given to her by the other CC chiefs during their conversation. It was not an all-inclusive list but items for consideration.</p>

Next Steps</p>	<p>Nicole to email group a doodle poll with hopes of selecting a date for maximum participation in late October or early November.</p> <p>Nicole will be emailing her new workgroup, Julio, Daryl and Anne to begin more research.</p> <p>Nicole will reach out to the survey team to prepare a sample survey.</p>
