# CLASS Supplemental Report Assessment Questions #10 and #11 May 31, 2010

As of May 2010, data to answer placement-related CLASS questions are **not available via the Cal-PASS SMART Tool or MIS**. This supplemental report addresses placement-related questions based on local data and a modified cohort as recommended by CLASS. Students in the modified cohort were assessed in English and/or Mathematics during the Fall 2006 assessment period and attended Grossmont-Cuyamaca Community College District in Fall 2006. These students were **not** necessarily new to college. Please refer to CLASS Supplemental Reports dated November 2009 and March 2010 for additional information regarding this modified cohort.

Districtwide, 3,300 students were assessed for Fall 2006 and subsequently enrolled in any Fall 2006 course. Approximately two thirds of these students (2,122) were placed into pre-collegiate math and/or English. In Fall 2006, pre-collegiate English placement courses were English 90 and English 98. Pre-collegiate Math placement courses were Math 80, Math 88, Math 89, and Math 90.

This report focuses on those students who were placed into pre-collegiate math and/or English and subsequently took any of four "gateway" courses: English 110 (College Composition), Math 175 (College Algebra), History 108 (Early American History), or History 109 (Modern American History). Gateway courses were identified by departments based on criteria provided by the CLASS project.

### **CLASS Queries**

- 10. What is the rate of successful **COLLEGIATE** gateway course completion for cohort students who were assessed as **PRE-COLLEGIATE/BASIC SKILLS** students but *bypassed* the RELATED **PRE-COLLEGIATE/BASIC SKILLS** course sequence? Disaggregate this percentage by race/ethnicity and gender, in addition to the rate for all cohort students. <u>Note that this is **not** the CLASS cohort.</u>
- 11. How does that rate (#10 above) compare with the rate of successful **COLLEGIATE** course completion for cohort students who were assessed as a **PRE-COLLEGIATE/BASIC SKILLS** student and *completed* the RELATED **PRE-COLLEGIATE/BASIC SKILLS** course sequence? Disaggregate this percentage by race/ethnicity and gender, in addition to the rate for all cohort students. Note that this is **not** the CLASS cohort.

Results for CLASS Questions 10 and 11 are presented separately for English (Tables 2 - 6), Mathematics, and History (Tables 7 - 11). All data are presented for the Grossmont-Cuyamaca Community College District as a whole.

# **English**

The following section shows information on English gateway course (English 110) success rates through Spring 2009 for students who were assessed into pre-collegiate English (English 090 or English 098) for Fall 2006. Rates are presented separately for two subgroups:

- (1) Enrollments for students who successfully completed the highest level pre-collegiate English placement course, English 98, prior to enrolling in the English gateway course
- (2) Enrollments for students who did not successfully complete the highest level pre-collegiate English placement course, English 98, prior to enrolling in the English gateway course

Table 2 shows the number of students in each subgroup, as well as the number of gateway course enrollments. Note that English 98 is a prerequisite for English 110. Students who placed into precollegiate English 90 or 98 but did not successfully complete English 98 prior to enrolling in English 110 would have been required to demonstrate equivalent preparation, for example through post-test advising, taking the English 98 prerequisite at another college, successfully completing ESL 106, or placing into English 110 via the ESL assessment process.

# **Math**

Ten of the 892 students (1.1%) who assessed into pre-collegiate Math in Fall 2006 enrolled in the gateway Math course, Math 175: College Algebra, by Spring 2009. Success rates are not included in this report due to low enrollment numbers.

### **History**

The following section shows information on History gateway course (HIST 108 and HIST 109) success rates through Spring 2009 for students who were assessed into pre-collegiate English (English 090 or English 098) for Fall 2006. Students may have taken a History gateway course prior to assessment.

Rates are presented separately for two subgroups:

- (1) Enrollments for students who successfully completed the highest level pre-collegiate English placement course, English 98, prior to enrolling in the History gateway course
- (2) Enrollments for students who did not successfully complete the highest level pre-collegiate English placement course, English 98, prior to enrolling in the History gateway course

Table 7 shows the number of gateway course enrollments for each subgroup.
